

Types of Stress

Positive stress

- · Adverse experiences that are short-lived
- · Normal and part of developmental processes

Tolerable stress

- · More intense but relatively short-lived
- With adequate support, unlikely to cause long-term problems

Toxic stress

- Sustained adversity
- · Children unable to manage this by themselves

















Healing Hurt People (HHP): A Violence Intervention Program

- · Clients are:
 - Victims of intentional injury (stabbing, shooting, assault)
 - 18-30 years old (Hahnemann University Hospital)
 - -8-21 (St. Christopher's Hospital for Children)
 - Not victims of intimate partner violence or sexual assault



TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE

- Trauma-informed care: This is a new form of evidence-based interventions and service delivery, implemented by multiple service providers, that identifies, assesses, and heals people injured by, or exposed to, violence and other traumatic events.




TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACH


- (1) Realizes the prevalence of trauma
- (2) Recognizes how trauma affects all individuals involved with the program, organization, or system, including its own workforce
- (3) Responds by putting this knowledge into practice.
- (4) Acknowledges the past and present stress imparted by racism, discrimination, poverty and marginalization.
- (5) Creates ways for the voices of those affected by violence to be heard.
















HVIP'S AND PHILADELPHIA VIOLENCE PREVENTION COLLABORATIVE
